Abstract:

Humanitarian aid, socio-spatial dynamics, and the evolution of refugee camps in the Gaza Strip

My PhD research aims to understand the evolution process of the urban refugee camps in the Gaza Strip. My research questions are: -What socio-spatial dynamics have influenced the evolution of the urban refugee camps? -How do these dynamics shape the governance and the living conditions in the studied refugee camps? -How does the prolonged provision of humanitarian aid affect and get affected by the socio-spatial dynamics of the urban refugee camps? I employ Critical Realism to underpin my methodological and theoretical approaches. The research also investigates the assemblage of camp formation. I borrowed from Agamben to study the refugee subject. I adopt the notion of "city-like" camps, engaging with the contemporary work of scholars such as Agier and Sanyal. I used mixed qualitative methods, including documentary review, field observation, and semi-structured interviews, during my fieldwork, comparing the two camps, Deir Al Balah and Jabalia in Gaza. In my findings, I define the "state of paradox" as a new shift for camps from the "state of exception". The findings highlight the temporary-permanent socio-spatial conditions that link the current shape of the camp space, the living conditions, and the governance practices.
